


- 92%** In my county, there is a need for a warming center for those who are experiencing homelessness.
- 92%** In my county, a warming center would be an effective use of my tax money.
- 59%** If there was a warming center, I would volunteer at it.
- 72%** If there was a warming center, I would donate to it.
- 96%** I would be comfortable with a warming center in my county.
- 93%** I would be comfortable with a warming center in my city.
- 75%** I would be comfortable with a warming center in my neighborhood.
- 64%** I would be comfortable with a warming center on my block.

Who does the public think should be responsible for funding a warming center?


